HumanKind recognizes the importance of nurturing human potential by creating and delivering compassionate solutions that teach children and families how to persevere through their unique challenges. We have adapted and thrived for 114 years and will continue to be a force for positive change in the communities we serve.

While 2017 was filled with many impactful milestones with those we serve, it also brought the end of an era in Zuni. National advocates for those with Developmental Disabilities pushed through legislation that requires that people be cared for in "community based settings" and Zuni's capacity for 40 individuals deemed it institutional. I am pleased to share that all of our residents transitioned to excellent community-based settings and many remain in our care.

Our Day in the Country celebration in Zuni was heartwarming with comments from staff, volunteers, our long time church supporters and one of our first students from 1967. Ray Terrell inspired us with his story of overcoming challenges as a very young child, then growing up on our Presbyterian Homes campus, completing his training and going into the community where he worked for 42 years at Southampton Memorial hospital. Like Ray, HumanKind has been resilient in adapting to an ever changing landscape of human services, persevering to continue transforming lives.

With the Zuni transition, the addition of workforce development and Healthy Families celebrating 20 years of providing services, it is gratifying to see lives and families transformed by enhanced parenting and work skills, new opportunities and better income. We are humbled to play a role and appreciate your investment in those we serve.

With your investment in HumanKind, we were able to partner with over 6,700 children, individuals and families across the Commonwealth providing critical resources and support on their path to stability. We envision a time when everyone is greeted with compassion, where families are healthy and communities prosper.

Zuni Campus Closes after 50 years

With changes in federal regulations from the Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services (DBHDS), our Zuni Campus began a transition in 2016 that culminated in April of 2017 and included successful transitions for all 39 residents into approved community-based settings of smaller group homes, sponsored homes or supervised living apartments. Other placements include returning home with family members. Marking the end of an era, hundreds of people from the tidewater community came out for a final Day in the Country celebration on the Zuni Campus that marked HumanKind's 50 years of serving individuals with Developmental Disabilities. A day of celebration and transition helped lead the way for evolving our care to best meet the needs of todau's individuals and their families. HumanKind's Adult Services programs have proactively addressed the new regulations ensuring that our individuals could qualify for Medicaid Waivers to support them throughout their life and continue to provide opportunities for them to thrive in a community.

HumanKind has group homes at full capacity in Fredericksburg, Lexington and Lynchburg; has significantly increased capacity in Sponsored Homes and developed licensing for Supervised Living all to support the needs of both our individuals from Zuni as well as those across the state of Virginia looking for newly approved community-based setting environments. Support during the times of transition

remains high as we continue to evolve and grow capacity to meet the growing needs. Our mission remains to be providing individuals with Developmental Disabilities with the highest quality of care, support independent living and offer the best quality of life, and supporting them and their families.

High Quality of LIfe found in Sponsored Homes

A number of individuals from our Zuni Campus transitioned into Sponsored Homes, which is an alternative service model from the traditional group home setting. This program provides the same around-the-clock care that one would receive in a group home, but in a smaller, more intimate home environment. The Sponsor in the home provides all of the care for the individual, and receives the same extensive training through HumanKind same as required for group home staff. There can be no more than two individuals in the same home receiving care from a Sponsor, which also represents a shift from the group home model.

While the Zuni Campus provided high quality care and was a special place, the individuals who have transitioned to live with a Sponsor are flourishing. Since moving into a Sponsored Home and receiving more 1-on-1 care, many of the individuals are gaining more autonomy over their day-to-day lives, enjoying employment in the community and their personalities are blooming in exciting ways.



Workforce Development

In June, HumanKind executed a formal agreement with the Region 2000 Workforce Development Board (WDB) to assume administration of the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) Title I Adult Program and become the region's One-Stop Operator. Using the Bridges Out of Poverty framework and similar initiatives, HumanKind helps under-resourced job seekers or those with barriers to employment with life and career development skills. Working in partnership with the Virginia Employment Commission, Virginia Department of Aging and Rehabilitative Services, Adult Education of Central Virginia, Old Dominion Job Corp, Central Virginia Community College, local departments of Social Services and other education or community stakeholders throughout the region, HumanKind staff coordinates resources to prepare individuals for living wage careers within the region. HumanKind is responsible for outreach throughout the region to ensure that career resources

available in the comprehensive One Stop Center are available through libraries, adult education sites and other access points in every locality.

As the One-Stop Operator, HumanKind is responsible for coordinating efforts among the region's workforce partners as well as responding to the hiring needs of the business community.

The new Workforce Development team has worked quickly to get operations up and running for the Adult Program Service Operator and Workforce System Operator. Each case manager serves 35-50 at full capacity and tracks clients for one year following credential or job attainment.





- Childcare Resource Center served 1,278 early childhood educators with training and resources.

- Healthy Families celebrated 20 years having served more than 6,000 people across Central Virginia
 and providing home visiting to 617 people in 2017.
- Family Education Partnership served students struggling behaviorally and academically. Teachers reported 88% of their students improvements in academics, social-emotional, and family engagement.
